

Recommended Species for Meadow Plantings in Northern Virginia

Produced by the Virginia Department of Conservation & Recreation, The Clifton Institute, and
Virginia Working Landscapes, November 2019

This is a list of species that we recommend for use in native meadow plantings in the 16 county region surrounding Shenandoah National Park (see: <http://www.vaworkinglandscapes.org/about/where-we-work>). The physiographic region and soil moisture where the species may be planted appropriately are given. We recommend that local ecotype seeds (i.e. seed collected in our region or in Virginia) be planted whenever possible. Seed companies and nurseries specify the origin of most seeds and seedlings. Seeds of most of the species on this list are available from Ernst Conservation Seed (<https://www.ernstseed.com/>). Additional species, and some species with Virginia ecotypes are available from Roundstone Native Seed (<https://roundstoneseed.com/>). At least two nurseries in our area, Earth Sangha in Fairfax (<https://www.earthsangha.org/wpnlist>), and Hill House Nursery in Rappahannock County (<http://hillhousenativeplants.com/>), sell a variety of locally sourced native meadow plants.
